New housing option opens in Edwardsville



Recently, six persons served by Trinity moved into the May Apartments in Edwardsville, Illinois. The newly renovated, 60-unit complex is located in the heart of town. The move was made possible by a collaboration between the residents, Trinity Services, and the Illinois Department of Human Services (DHS).

In 2015, DHS began the Supported Housing Initiative. It is set up to assist persons with disabilities to receive the amount of support they desire, and to control their homes. The apartments are funded under this initiative.

Trinity provides services, such as employment assistance, transportation, education, and skill development. Overnight staff is not provided, but each apartment is equipped with an electronic security system. It is based on sensors (not video technology), which allows for non-intrusive support, such as alerting residents if a door or window is ajar.

Privacy and independence are key. Currently, persons living at the May Apartments receive support that ranges from 20 to 53 hours a week.

(AT) and digital technology is rapidly expanding options for persons with disabilities. Unfortunately, a majority of persons served by Trinity and other community-based providers have extremely low incomes, with no Internet, mobile phone or cable TV in the home.

Trinity is committed to addressing the many possibilities and challenges of today's technologies for the persons it serves. Its newest effort involves the first-ever, statewide assistive technology conference for persons with disabilities in Illinois.

The event will be held June 6 and 7 at the Tinley Park Convention Center. It is co-hosted by the National Association for QIDPs (NAQ).

The event will provide tools and resources for individuals with disabilities, families, direct support staff, and decision makers at the state and provider levels. All of the featured technologies are proven, affordable and based on person-centered principles.

Topics will include how to identify AT that can support a person's goals and dreams, how to remove barriers to accessing AT, and how to support a person to use AT to engage in competitive employment, live more independently, manage complex medical needs, and/or fully participate in the life of his/her community.

Trinity friends recently made snow globes at the Social Center with everyday ingredients, such as jars, mineral oil, dish soap and glue.



Numbers Tell Stories

Nursing students interning at Trinity

Through a partnership with the Chamberlain College of Nursing, Trinity is enhancing the medical supports it provides. Chamberlain students can now get clinical experience at a number of Trinity's Joliet-area houses and Adult Learning programs. Each year, about 72 students participate—six at a time at two Trinity locations for each of the program's six semesters.

The students lead informative presentations on health topics that Trinity staff suggest. Both the staff and persons Trinity serves have learned about topics, such as heart health, low vision issues, hand washing, falls, and wound care.

The students also spend some of their time helping Trinity's medical staff with clerical work and recording "vitals", such as blood pressure and weight.

The primary goal is for the students to learn about persons who have intellectual/developmental disabilities so they can provide informed care once they graduate. Supervised by Visiting Professor Susan Pickell, MSN, the interns accompany and observe the persons Trinity serves every Tuesday and Wednesday.

One assignment involves not providing medical care but simply learning about a person's abilities, interests and activities. Prof. Pickell finds that students who spend time interacting with persons who have I/DD, even on a non-medical basis, can gain valuable insights for their nursing work.

Trinity appreciates this partnership for two reasons. The persons served are learning and enjoying the new relationships. And, the benefits are likely to include more well-informed, compassionate care for persons with disabilities in the region's medical facilities.

Trinity earns person-centered accreditation with distinction

This winter, Trinity was again awarded Person-Centered Excellence Accreditation with Distinction from the Council on Quality and Leadership (CQL).

The partnership with CQL requires Trinity to engage in a rigorous process of reviews and improvements. This work culminated in November with the four-year accreditation.

Trinity gratefully acknowledges all of its employees, leaders and supporters. Their ongoing efforts make this level of achievement possible.

Since 1992, Trinity has earned the highest accreditation possible. It



is one of just six organizations in the U.S. to hold its current, elite status.

CQL, an international group, works exclusively with organizations that serve persons with developmental disabilities.

In its final review, the Council praised Trinity specifically for being a learning organization: "It strives to continuously improve, evolve and enhance its services and supports. The essence of the mission is well known.




